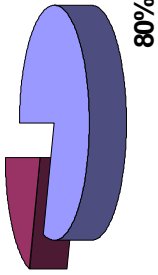


Treatment and Recidivism Rates



A 15 Year Study; “concluded that more than 80% of sex offenders who have undergone treatment do not reoffend within 15 years.”

The State of Texas Council on Sex Offender Treatment (CSOT) quotes the December 2002 publication of Psychiatry News in an article titled, “Sex Offender Recidivism Rate Below Expectations.”

Are Strangers Really the Danger?

- 93% of the victims of sexual abuse know their offender. 50% of those offenders were family members. The rest were acquaintances; coaches, teachers, clergy, etc.
- Only 7% were offended by a stranger.
- 85% of offenses occur in a residence.

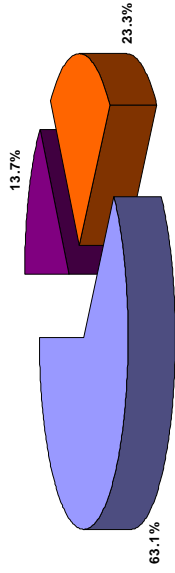

13.7% Sexually Reoffend
 23.3% Non-Sexual Offense or Other (Technical)
 63.1% WILL NOT REOFFEND IN ANY WAY

This international comprehensive study examined research concerning recidivism risk factors for sexual offenders. Predictors indicate that:

- (1) over 63% of all sexual offenders will not reoffend,
- (2) sex offenders are more likely to reoffend with a non-sexual (technical) offense and
- (3) only 13.7% are predicted to commit a new sexual crime.

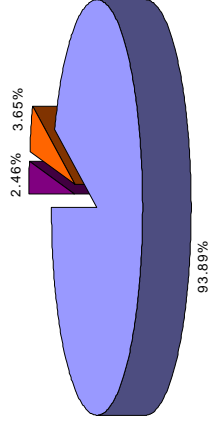
A total of 95 different studies were reviewed and compiled, involving more than 31,000 sexual offenders over 40 years using approximately 2,000 recidivism predictions.

4,762 Paroled Offenders (Statistics gathered over a period of 11 years)



2.46% Returned Different Offense
 3.65% Returned Same Offense
 93.89% DID NOT REOFFEND IN ANY WAY

Re-offense Rates Are Lower Than You Think

According to a recent report by the US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Statistics. Within 3 years, of the 9,691 released sex offenders,

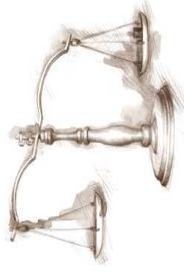
- only 5.3% were rearrested for a sex crime and
- only 3.5% were reconvicted for a sex crime

LAWS

Megan's Law and associated amendments have been created based on cases involving abduction, sexual assault and murder. These represent less than 1% of the overall sex crime statistics but affect 100% of the cases.
