The group living environment of the ministry requires that these values be practiced and lived daily. It's a messy laboratory with frequent missteps and the occasional explosion that are used as learning tools, resolved through constructive confrontation, and left in the past. The unchanging lessons – cooperation, accountability, and responsibility are essential characteristics in the foundation of free living.

It's easy to put a name to these lessons; there is nothing easy about practicing them. In fact it can be dismayingly difficult, and no one has a perfect record. Like any learning process, New Name can only succeed with the consent of the pupil, and one year is a short time to learn. So the essential lessons to be transmitted are that these principals are the subject of lifelong learning and have to be practiced daily during and after the time at the ministry. The other is that graduation does not remove someone from the New Name community. There is always someone there to talk with when times are difficult or confusing.

There will always be failures, and when they occur the news is transmitted throughout the community of New Name participants and graduates within minutes. We look for the common thread. A word that occurs to me recently is "impatience."

"Neither a borrower, nor a lender be..."

This is a phrase familiar to most over the age of forty, but probably few will know its origin. The language has a proverbial sound or maybe something from *Poor Richard's* Almanac? Well, Proverbs does speak on the subject ("...the borrower is servant to the lender."22:7), and Ben Franklin's folksy sayings are legendary, but this pithy admonition is from William Shakespear. A character from the play <u>Hamlet</u> gives his son advice about entering into polite society listing several "do's and not to do's" including this priceless financial gem, not to borrow nor to lend, "...for loan oft loses both itself and friend..."

What great advice! Haven't we all found that, after loaning money to family or friend, they don't seem to come around as much as before? Or, conversely, am I the only one who has taken the long way 'round to avoid a creditor in the path ahead? It is important to recognize that this father is talking about forming healthy relationships, and debt will change the nature of relationship, or stifle it entirely. Debt tends to produce disillusionment, resentment, alienation and maybe even abandonment.

Desires for more and newer material things are relatively easy to control if one is willing. Impatience for a romantic relationship is a more difficult and recurring issue and one that can easily lead to foolish behavior. This is not a statement on morality, nor is it an unnecessary review of why someone would want a relationship. It is a statement about premature actions and consequences.

Relationships, platonic and otherwise are almost universally addressed in parole restrictions, and opinions about their fairness are irrelevant and not a reason for disobedience. There is a unique danger here because relationships can put a parolee close to the circumstances that help lead to their crime, and the turbulence of a relationship gone bad is of a particularly dangerous variety, on or off parole.

New Name is not just for one year. It exists to be part of a graduate's life for as long as it is wanted or needed. The ministry is there to help during and after parole, and it hopes that all who come into its program will eventually have healthy, lasting relationships, but they should not be initiated from need, envy, or weakness. They are not a substitute for the practice of the principles stated earlier. Relationships only have a realistic chance of success if they come after the foundations are solid. It's not on our time, nor is it a case of perceived readiness. God will provide the opportunity when one is indeed ready.

A recurring topic in this newsletter is preparedness for parole. The first months out of prison are a busy time, and the list of things to be accomplished can be intimidating. New Name Ministries has always recognized this and devotes a great deal of time and energy to making these initial steps back into the world go as smoothly as possible. We are not going to let you forget things and will make sure you are where you need to be.

Just about every aspect of life including a parolee's re-entry has been complicated by the Covid-19 pandemic. Several of our men have been tested for the disease because of potential exposure on the job. Fortunately all have come back negative, but masks, social distancing, and business closures are significantly affecting our lives as well. By far the most pervasive effect has been the closure of state and local government offices.

A friend was telling me about a conversation he had with his son; theirs is a contentious relationship, and as is often the case their conversation arrived at an impasse. "Well, son, I'll pray for you about this problem," said my friend. His son was annoyed at this, saying "There you go with your prayers again, Dad! Can't you just give me some fatherly advice without all that God stuff ?" It seemed that just the mention of the Holy Spirit's power to resolve issues in our lives was enough to arouse a sort of resentment in the son. The thought occurred to me that often it is not the actions of others that foster angry resentment in us, but rather our own indictment of the shortcomings we see in ourselves. In other words, my creditors weren't hounding me for payment; but certainly the mere thought of them made me remember my delinquent accounts, and my shame. Could it be that this young man had a similar sense of shame -- for whatever perceived shortcoming, whatever unkept promise—that created this agitation in the presence of his dad...or perhaps in the sight of the heavenly Father?

This is the kind of imbalance that drives a wedge between family and friends, a sense of being judged and found wanting, even if that sentiment is not expressed. My friend wasn't judging his son in offering prayers,

For example, the Department of Public Safety (DPS) offices have been fully or partially closed since March complicating the process for obtaining or renewing a driver's license. DPS has gone to an appointment system, but there is a large back log of expired licenses, including mine. Fortunately the public is under a grace period. The closure of offices has also complicated visits with parole, therapists, and health care providers, but these complications are steadily improving. There is no end in sight to the Covid-19 situation, but with patience and cooperation everyone will get through.

New Name excels at helping men through this busy initial period of parole. Job number one is establishing your identity, and the critical documents needed to do this are a social security card and birth certificate. As soon as possible begin the process with TDCJ to have these documents supplied to you at or before your release. Be persistent; these are required to obtain a driver's license or a state ID card, which is the gateway to employment, bank accounts, and government benefits. When receiving these documents take time to verify that all the information is correct, and let Reentry know immediately if it is not.

During relative short five and a half years I was in prison there were significant changes in how daily business is conducted in the free world. Paper job applications are disappearing, and a current e-mail address is more critical administratively than a physical address. It's an electronic world, and like it or not, we all have to enter it. This entry will be made much easier with the proper documents in hand from the beginning.

he merely wanted to share the peace and joy which comes from his relationship with God. But for the boy, it must have felt like an indictment. Like he was short in his accounts, like he was late with his payment.

Which brings me back to the debt. If a friend asks for a "small business loan" of, say, \$20.00, I'm often able to provide that. But in my mind, I don't think of it as a loan at all, but rather as a gift. If it returns to me, great! But knowing how the best intentions oft go awry, I don't really expect it back. There is no debt.

This is the model that Jesus provided for us, the benefit that doesn't have to be repaid—in fact *cannot be* repaid. Christ cleared the account for us, because our Father wants relationship and fellowship with us, His children. Too often we seek to avoid Him, feeling we have fallen short. But He is not the Great Lender, and we His debtors; He is a giver and we the heirs to all His riches. Abundant life truly is a "free offer". We have only to accept it.
